Let's Party for Peace - by Rev. Sara Lewis

You may recall that a feature of Rev Mary's Installation this spring included an exchange of gifts, which is a traditional and common practice for a ministerial installation in a congregation. OUUC gave Rev Mary a stole, made by the Sewing Ministry Team, and Rev Mary gave OUUC a <u>Peace Pole</u>. There are estimated to be about 200,000 peace poles around the world, proclaiming our common wish for and commitment to peace on earth.

Our UU values of inherent worth and dignity, interdependence, and compassion all support a call to work toward a world of peace and justice for all. And while we have never been united in an understanding of pacifism (see some interesting history-here), we have long worked for peace. Peace work has also been important to many here at OUUC, with past projects including Nuclear Disarmament classes and talks and the creation of memorial markers for the civilian casualties of our wars in Afghanistan and Iraq.

Now we will have a new visual reminder of peace, which I hope will help us reflect on how peace is part of our values, part of our practices, and part of our hopes and aspirations for the world. A big Thank You to Rev Mary for this gift!

The Buildings and Grounds Team have identified a great spot for the Peace Pole, right near the main entrance. They've already dug the hole, which is now marked with an orange cone for safety. Thank you, B&G! And now we can all join in: when a peace pole is "planted", there is a ceremony to perform. As Rev Mary and I were looking at the fall calendar, we realized that we could hold this event near <u>International Day of Peace</u>, which is September 21st.

Which brings us to the planned Party for Peace at OUUC on Saturday September 24th, 4-7pm.

Please join us for the planting and dedication of the peace pole, for a potluck dinner, and for activities and discussions of peace. There will be something for all ages, and this will be a chance to be in community together outdoors as well.

Quixote Village to Quixote Communities: A growing mission and vision to serve the unhoused - by Joe Shorin



Most OUUC members know the basics of OUUC's instrumental role in creating Quixote Village: OUUC was the first faith community to provide sanctuary to the residents of an unauthorized homeless community camped on City of Olympia property in 2007; its members and leaders were instrumental in a multi-year and multi-organizational effort to host Camp Quixote; and during that time, they were actively engaged in the planning and development of Quixote Village, a 30-unit tiny home village on Mottman Road built to provide permanent supportive housing for people experiencing homelessness.

"We are proud of the success of our model and our residents, and we are excited to be offering a variety of expanded services to meet the needs of our community." Colleen Carmichael, Executive Director of Quixote Communities.

Quixote Communities will recognize OUUC and other founding faith organizations at its Tiny Homes—Big Future celebration on **Saturday, September 17 from 6:30pm - 9:30pm at the Hands on Children's Museum**. This will be a fun <u>outdoor</u> event with live music by Vendredi's Bag and food from the Crowded Kitchen. Tickets are only \$20, include food and drink, and will help support Quixote Communities' work to provide permanent supportive rental housing for veterans and other homeless folks in Thurston, Mason, and Pierce Counties.
